


Parents, What Should We Be Looking For From The Game?

Is there a difference between a 16 year old and a 5 year old?








Player to Parent Relationship

Parent Roles and Responsibilities

- Focusing on your child's enjoyment
- Support your child's endeavors
- Model acceptable behaviour to your children
 - Reaffirming your child's self confidence during practices and games
- Keeping your player focused on participation and fun, not results
- Parents need to be positive, understanding, and responsible!









Parent to Coach Relationship

Coaches and Parents

- Respect coaches' duties, goals and responsibilities
- Always be positive and respectful when communicating with coaches.
- Let the coaches coach
- 24 hour rule







Parent to Coach Relationship

Value-Based Coaching

- What is value-based coaching?
- There are many values that coaches relay to players through words or actions, including responsibility and respect.
- Parents need to work in conjunction with coaches to ensure your children take these values to heart.







Parent to Coach Relationship

Value-Based Coaching

- Parents must work with coaches to reinforce learned values
- Children constantly look to coaches for instruction and approval
- Most coaches are volunteers
- Respect must be practiced toward all parties involved, all the time!

Affecting Change in Parents

- The "silent majority" most people do not express their opinions publically
 - group dynamics and effective problem solving
- Interact respectfully and responsibly with other parents
- Let communication and common sense help during difficult times








Parent to Parent Relationship

Fostering Parental Respect and Responsibility

- The onus is on ALL parents to act in preventing unacceptable conduct


Implementation of Educational Programs


- Educational Programs available for coaches, officials and risk managers

Parent Conduct Policy

Refer to CMHA Policy Manual - Section 20

Key points:

- Parents play an important role in promoting a positive environment for all participants in hockey; thus CMHA will not tolerate poor conduct by the parents of the Association.
- Parents are responsible for their own conduct and the conduct of their children (as spectators) at all Association related events (e.g. games, practices, tournaments attended at by the team, etc.). Parents and their children (spectators) must not exhibit any disorderly, abusive, harassing, or disrespectful conduct before, during or after any Association related event.







Locker Room Best Practices

Locker Room Policies are updated yearly.

Key points:

- No harassment or bullying is to be tolerated. Section 27 of the Policy Manual can be consulted for details.
- Players are not left alone in dressing rooms. Parents requested to not be in the room starting at Atom/PeeWee age (kids start learning to tie own skates).
- Team Officials must pair up when in the dressing room.
- NO CAMERAS or ELECTRONIC DEVICES of any kind are permitted to be used in dressing rooms. This is to protect both the kids and team officials.
- No smoking (includes vaping), alcohol or drugs.







Team Formation

Rep 'A' Hockey:


- Tryouts are held starting in Mid August. Independent Evaluators are brought in to facilitate tryouts through an RFP process each year.
- The full Rep Tryout Policy can be found on the website.
- Rep team families commit to additional ice time and expenses – information about this can be found on the Rep Parent Information page of the website.

Recreational 'C' Hockey:

Evaluation skates are held starting in early September.
 Scoring is completed for each skater to determine skill level.
 These scores are used to evenly distribute players of each skill level to evenly balance all the teams in each Division.







Ice Times

Ice in Surrey:

- Severe shortage of available ice in Surrey. Ice is allocated based on City of Surrey ice allocation policy – they have many other user groups in demand for the ice.
- To supplement this, we also purchase ice privately from several other arenas, at a much higher cost. Most years more than half our ice is purchased privately.
- This means that ice times are sometimes less than ideal, and creative scheduling by our families can be necessary.
- We continue to work with the City and private supporters to further the cause to bring more ice to our members. We encourage our membership to do the same.

Player Development

Why the emphasis on Player Development?

- Several years ago, the membership began to notice that our teams were falling behind other Associations in skill level.
- We began to create a Player Development program to provide access for our members to sessions that could develop the skills they need to succeed on the ice.
- This has now grown to the level where all Initiation players receive free Development every week, and most other Divisions have free or low cost sessions on a bi-weekly basis.
- We have also expanded this program to include goalie training to ensure goalies develop along with the players.
- We are happy to see our teams are again succeeding, and players are also having great experiences in their development sessions.







Complaint Procedure

Refer to CMHA Policy Manual - Section 21

Key points:

- CMHA recognizes and understands that, throughout the hockey season, there may be minor issues that arise on teams that may lead to complaints (e.g. a parent to a coach in relation to the amount of ice time received by their child, a coach to a parent about the parent's inappropriate behaviour, etc.). The following are guidelines to deal with minor team related complaints:
- Initially, all complaints must be dealt with between the parties (e.g. a coach and a parent) in an effort to resolve the complaint.







Complaint Procedure

Refer to CMHA Policy Manual - Section 21

- Neither party may approach the other about the issue for forty-eight (48) hours; however the issue may be brought to the attention of the team manager within this timeframe for his/her information.
- If one party wishes to discuss the issue with the other party after forty-eight (48) hours, this must be arranged through the team manager and the team manager must participate in the discussion as a neutral facilitator and observer.
- If, after the above-noted discussion the issue is not resolved, the party making the complaint may take the complaint to the Division Director.
